



It laughs even at the lightest trigger and cries when it feels like to: in all a child's emotions are unpredictable. Humans are thus in their indigenous form irrational beings. As humans tend to grow and socialise, they realise how humanity is entangled in the affairs of an apparent rational world.

Rationality refers to the quality of being based on or in accordance with reason or logic. One might wonder if rationality is an individual concept or a social construct. George Herbet Mead in his theory of 'I versus Me' explains that as humans grow from the play stage to the game stage, they develop an understanding of what the society considers rational.

We are made to believe that 'if it is not rational, it is not right' and in an attempt to prove oneself right, the probable irrational humans wear the cloak of rationality and pretend to be amused by the decisions driven out of logic.

Should our decisions be based on logic? Do emotions have any role to play in manipulating our decisions? It is believed that one who is emotional is weak, but this is not always true. Emotions are human's unique asset. A robot can imitate human intelligence, but it is emotions which places humans above robots. Peter Watts writes, 'People are not rational, we are not thinking machines, we're feeling machines that happen to think.' It is our emotions that help us arrive at better logical inferences.

While rationality may help us in arriving at better conclusions, however when rationality is used to prove one's selfish endeavours, it becomes deleterious.

As Oscar Card states, 'Your trust in rationality makes you irrational? For instance Olympe de Gouges, who was a playwright during the Renaissance period wrote in her play 'spirit of reason' that the civil rights propounded in the French Revolution applied to women also. She was beheaded in response to her perfect rationality — Was it then not an evil and murderous irrationality? I leave it up to you to decide that.'

Who determines rationality, one might think, since whenever individuals speak against established norm, they are susceptible to ostracism. Take for e.g. the cow vigilanism in India which is a unique feature not to be found anywhere else in the world. This then means that something which seems rational in one circumstance would be irrational in some other circumstance.

The legitimacy to rationality is then given by religious elites (Dark Ages), Social elites (caste system in India), political elites (rational policies) and many other elites in different sectors. Steven Lukes, calls it the Third Phase of Power - in that all those who exercise power have the ability to manipulate and shape the opinions of the larger masses. However it becomes detrimental for humanity, when the so called rational-legal authorities justify the rationality of their private skewed interests by making orthodox statements, biased policies, favouring despotic rule and nepotism. Danger looms over humanity then. For instance Adolf Hitler justified the rationality of the superior German race and the consequences (Holocaust, World Wars), are enough evidence to showcase the fact that in trying to make irrational seem rational, the price one will have to pay is beyond human imagination.

Remarks

"Animals are rational as they, don't get mired in deliberation & hesitation and execute actions perfectly suited to them", says Justin Smith. On the other hand humans as always-paralyzed by doubt and worry and their acts of rationality keeps on changing with time.

Post Industrial Revolution, it was globally believed that one who could maximise the exploitation of nature to meet human needs would emerge as neo-global leaders. Countries across the world were satisfied with the rationality of development at the cost of nature.

New, it is exactly opposite #Climate change. Green is the new catchphrase. Sustainable development and the co-existence of nature and human welfare is the new rationality. Rationality is thus, not constant; it keeps on evolving both in space and time. It is hence imperative that rationality is accompanied with critical reasoning and discussion so that the challenges

bound to appear at a later stage are mitigated earlier.

Rationality is not mere logical thinking. One cannot ignore the role of feelings. Plato describes the dichotomous role of logic and feelings in his theory of 'Two competing horses'. The white horse, he says represents logic and the black horse represents feelings. The culmination lies in the balance between the two horses. Although successful people, he says, have a better grip on the white horse.

Plato's theory is contradicted in the scientific discoveries made in the course of time. For instance the falling of apple, the accidental discovery of X-Ray, radioactivity and the steam engine are all based on irrational events. Albert Einstein once said, 'I never made one of my discoveries through the process of rational thinking! It is the very irrationality of human nature that allows us to observe, question & discover things.'

However one cannot ignore the importance of rationality in a society. It helps in maintaining the structure and order and delineating the right code of conduct. When rationality is based on moral reasoning, it guarantees the formation of an equal and just society. For instance, the Constitution of India acts as a guiding force in setting out the order of society. It is based on the logical thinking of our nationalist leaders.

~~It is not purely logical, it has an emotional tinge as well. It favours equality (Article 14) as well as positive discrimination. Similarly the clause of equality before~~

~~law and equal protection of law is a befitting example.~~

It is thus true that people cannot be purely rational at all times, there are exceptions because ultimately 'the heart wants what it wants'.

Swami Vivekananda quotes, 'In a conflict

For the small things in life are often so much bigger than the great things and blessed are those who see beautiful things in humble places.

Positive irrationality encourages humans to pursue what they really want to achieve even if it means going against the flow. Rationality on the other hand makes one status quoist. Francis Fukuyama in his

book 'The last man' quotes that the last man is averse to change. He is so content with the material pleasure and the rationality of events that he doesn't want to accept change and innovation.

Rationality can in such cases hinder progress and thus it is necessary to have a flexible frame of mind.

Democracy promotes free thinking, the rationale

behind the same is participation of people, however in reality the picture is quite deviant from the ideal rosy nation. Mosca notes that democracy can be by the people & for the people but never of the people.

Thus, an ideal rationality of thoughts should manifest itself pragmatically as well.

There is so much diversity in rationality - for someone authoritative regime is better while for others capitalistic regime and for the rest socialistic regime is the best; it sometimes seems that rationality itself is irrational. Consider the rationality of maths - the Pythagoreans had trouble dealing with the discovery of the existence of irrational numbers. Thus, it is better to follow the advice of Jeh. Knox here: 'An intelligent person can rationalise anything, a wise person just does not try: and ^{hence} enjoys life in eternity!'

 - justify decisions after you take them, even if they are wrong
 - value self interest over ethics
 - assert what we think is right
 - leads to ideas being implemented without scrutiny
