1. Indian Democracy is only as strong as its institutions. India's democratic institutions thrived essentially because of the respect of its leaders for ethical constitutionalism and public morality. In the light of above statement, analyze how constitutional ethics and public morality can help in making them more robust functioning institutions?

(150 Words) (10 Marks)

"Democracy" which as an idea finds a concrete shape in the institution. Institutions in democracy plays the role of rule making, rule implementation and adjudication.

The institutions are formed on the constitutional basis but their preservation is also grounded in ethics and public morality

Challenges However, we have also witnessed decline of ethics and public morality as there is a rise of corruption, criminalisation, defection and politics without principle.

Restoring constitutional ethics and public morality can help in —

- (A) Promoting transparency and accountability in the institution. e.g. RTI, CPGRM
- (B) Ensuring efficiency in public service delivery
 - ↳ Through the ideals of Gandhian and Karwadi
- (C) Guiding the behaviour of the leaders and
 - ↳ Protecting constitutional morality.
 - ↳ Reserving the public good

While Institution forms the body of the Indian democracy the ethical constitutionalism and public morality must form the soul of to realise the goal of socio-economic-political justice.

2. What is confirmation bias? How does it hinder ethical governance?

Confirmation bias refers to the attitude of conforming to the prevalent norms and culture. It is the quality of "fitting in" ✓

e.g. Jumping the red light, since all are doing it there is nothing wrong in it.

Confirmation bias is devoid of rationality and objectivity and promote prevalent culture. It is mostly the result of peer pressure ✓

Ethical Governance requires that not only the Governance is efficient but it incorporate ethics in process and procedures. ✓

Confirmation bias affecting ethical Governance

- Promote existing structure and culture.
↳ In case the Governance is already unethical it is productive if it is unethical confirmation bias leads to spiral effect.

Policy making has been described as a highly technical and value free task. The prime considerations are efficiency and effectiveness in policy making.

Ethical consideration are of secondary value in public policy traditionally. However, the modern policy making essentially incorporate ethical dimension. The role of ethics in policy making comes lies in following dimension.

- Determining the goal of policymaking
 - * with limited resources policy making essentially requires 'choice' between competing interest hence ethics becomes guide.
 e.g. Water for industry or agriculture.
- Determining the procedure
 - * The methods are as important as

e.g. In foreign policy, the use of hard power or soft power is essentially guided by ethical consideration.

Biocentrism philosophy incorporate the idea that all living beings are of equal moral worth. Human beings thus are ~~not~~ not superior rather equivalent to all biological life on earth.

At present the world faces the environmental crisis in climate change, deforestation, rising sea level, pollution, declining biodiversity and so on. Biocentrism presents an answer to these issues.

Biocentrism counters the following issues -

- ① Indiscriminate exploitation of natural resources.
↳ It advocates usages of means like Environment impact assessment, Natural capital accounting etc.
- ② From Human led development to Eco logically sustainable development
↳ keeping the ecosystem at heart in a development project.

Remarks

③ Equal value of life - protecting the biodiversity and habitat thus mainstreaming the ecology in development process.

④ From GDP to GNP (gross natural product)



The philosophy of Biocentrism realigns the concept that human interest and nature are antithetical. It promotes symbiotic relationship hence a more humane and natural development.

5. "Progressive space activism requires expanding our ethical circle to space". Comment in the light of Artemis program. (150 Words) (10 Marks)

Space forms the "global common" i.e. it is the shared resource of all countries and also the shared responsibility.

Artemis The rise in space activity with programmes like Artemis (Moon landing) and other private ventures like Blue Horizon ~~space~~ has raised few ethical questions

like -

- ⇒ Who is liable if any damage is done to other nation property?
- ⇒ Should space be weaponised?
- ⇒ unequal access to space technology
- ⇒ space colonization and ~~poor~~ race among nations.
- ⇒ Should space programme be undertaken when the earth faces high level of poverty and inequality?

The rules of conduct in space remains undefined, with only few conventions and agreements limited to few nations

Remarks

Space programme are thus operating in legal and moral free space. Thus ethics incorporation will help in -

- Democratization of space - allowing peaceful use of space technology and proliferation to other nations.
 - Ensuring disability - by developing suitable global and national laws.
 - Limiting the conduct ✓ by restricting activities like colonization and privatisation of space assets.
 - Making space programme development oriented by ensuring the technologies developed in space are accessible to all.
- legal and ethical framework should be developed under which the space programme must incorporate. this will not just ensure that space remains peaceful but will usher ethical space governance

6. "To oppose corruption in government is the highest obligation of patriotism". Comment
(150 Words) (10 Marks)

Patriotism is the feeling of love for one's country. The value of patriotism is foundational in developing fraternity and unity in the country.

Corruption, on the other hand involves misuse of power and position for selfish interest. Instead of country it focuses on individual ~~thus~~ threaten the progress of society.

Corruption in Government is even more serious as it leads to -

- (1) Deprivation of masses as corruption deutes the public services and thus push people into vicious cycle of poverty
- (2) Weaken democratic institute by allowing criminals and corrupt official to control them. how breakers become law makers
- (3) Weaken the social fabric as the focus shift from social justice to

individualistic gains thus leading to commercialisation, regionalisation and deepening of social fault lines.

8. Describe the process of crowd funding and reason out the benefits of promoting crowd funding? How values affects the prospects of crowd funding in India.
(150 Words) (10 Marks)

Crowd funding involves the borrowing/raising of money from a large pool of people with whom the borrower does not have a direct contact.

Process of crowd funding involves

- ① Publication of interest for borrowing/raising money (through advertisement or social campaign)
 - ② Creation of a specialised account
(However, an existing account could also be utilized)
 - ③ Donations / funds from people
- ↓ ✓ Discuss various purpose for which crowdfunding used

Benefits of crowd funding

- ① Low cost of funds for entrepreneurs
- ② Access to fund for people in distress.
e.g. Medical emergency funds raised through sites like Ketto.org.

Remarks

- ③ Mobilization of public saving for investment or social cause
- ④ Promotes Transparency and accountability of the borrower. as the funds are dependent upon these values.

Values affecting crowd funding

- ① Love and care for people in distress

(150 Words) (10 Marks)

Value pluralism denotes existence of multiple values without hierarchy. It means various values like equality, liberty, justice may exist side by side without any conflict.

Value pluralism promote 'Tolerance'. It regards that while there may be preference for some value that does not mean a conflict with some other value.

E.g. While some may advocate capitalism, socialist ideology adherent should not be despised rather tolerated.

India presents a cultural mosaic. Multiple country, religion, language, race, caste finds their home in India. The value of "Sarva Dharma Samashradh" and "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam" defines India.

Remarks

Pluralism is essentially a feature of Indian society. It survives increases in current context with rising cases of mob lynching, increases social cleavage.

Value pluralism is nothing new to Indian culture whether its importance needs to be emphasised. The constitution has already incorporated it with rights to religious freedom, culture and linguistic minority rights and values of equality, justice and liberty.

While in India we may not present a melting pot but certainly are a thali with each ~~total~~ bowl preserving its separate identity still being complimentary to the other, hence creating wholesome experience.

Gratitude makes a person realise the limitation and positivity makes him realise possibilities. A judicious mix of both thus ensure a life long success.





Citizen charter is a tool of people empowerment and participatory democracy, thus legislative backing of citizen charter is essential for good governance.

13. "The greatest virtue of bureaucracy is that it is an institutional method for applying general rules to specific cases" - Max Weber. Illustrate. (150 Words) (10 Marks)

Max Weber's bureaucratic model is institutional in nature. He creates an impartial and machinery to deliver public goods.

Weber's consideration is to eliminate discretion and to ensure uniform conduct of the bureaucracy to achieve efficiency and effectiveness.

Traditional bureaucracy has achieved it through -

- (a) Creation of hierarchical model of bureaucracy
- (b) Procedure and rule based approach

The benefit of rule based approach lies in -

- ① Ensuring rule of law and reducing corruption.

e.g. Parameters for beneficiary identification ensure objectivity in allocation of resources.

Remarks

Ensuring conduct based on Code of Conduct

↳ This allows bureaucracy to operate within the general rule of code of conduct in ~~or~~ specific cases, thus ensuring uniform conduct.

e.g. Rule 3 of civil services code of conduct indicate towards welfare of people, ^{general rule is} this is applied in case of disaster management resource allocation, policy formulation uniformly.

Discusses the various different duties civil servants have to do today.

Along with institutional approach, bureaucracy in modern times requires to be persuasive in its approach of civil servants this needs to flexible, adaptive and responsive to public demand to ensure they act as agents of change and promote spirit of service.

In the following questions carefully study the cases presented and then answer the questions that follows:

14. When Sheena reaches to one counter of the RTO office for her driving license renewal, the lady in-charge at the counter pass-on one form to fill for the same purpose. She asked Sheena to turn the page and go through it. Back side of the paper there was organ donation consent form which stated:

"Organ Donation: Upon my death I am willing to donate the following - there were three a set of boxes labelled - eyes, liver, kidney, any organ and nose, together with a place for her signature."

Sheena asks the lady - "why such things are being pushed at this counter" Lady at the counter explains that this form of camping has been promoted by NGOs for the large interest for humanity, however it is voluntary and she can escape it if she is not find it of any worth. Sheena was not sure about giving consent. She was in dilemma whether to do it or not. After a brief thought she denied and moved from that counter.

On the way to back home, her friend Indrani, who was also at the counter, suddenly said, "I did not wanted to say anything inside, but no way I would never sign that card. If you get into accident and they see that you have agreed for organ donation, they will not even try to save you. There is organ shortage, and the doctors want to grab what they can get. My mom says those organ donation cards are like signing your death warrant."

Later that evening Sheena decided to talk to one of her teacher. When she explained about her anxiety, teacher replied that she should follow her heart in the matter of organ donation.

Answer the following questions based on the above case study:

- From a utilitarian perspective, should Sheena agree to donate her organs? Provide an analysis.
- Do you think that people ought to donate their organs? Why or why not? (Make sure that the reasons you provide are ethical reasons, not merely prudent or legal). What will you advice to Sheena in case you are in place of her teacher?

(250 Words) (20 Marks)

In this case, organ donation is a very sensitive issue veryording with a lot of prejudice and misinformation prevail. The above case expresses such an incident.

Remarks

(a) Sheena is confused regarding her choice for organ donation, utilitarian perspective provides a direction to her.

The utilitarian principle of "Greatest Benefit of greatest number" in this case indicate that Sheena ~~should~~ sign the consent form. As multiple organs can save multiple lives.

Also refined utilitarianism of Hill advocate that there are certain higher pleasure that we pursue. "Saving life of other" is one such higher pleasure. So Sheena should ^{aggregate to} ~~not~~ donate organs.

However, the same philosophy also ^{discuss various} ~~consideration~~ ^{related with} lay emphasis on "desire" and "aversion". Since Sheena does ~~not~~ "desire" organ donation she might not do so.

Hence, Sheena from utilitarian perspective ~~should~~ be guided by her "desire", "higher pleasure" and "Greatest happiness number" of greatest Number" in order

Remarks

To make a decision.

If all three are aligned she should ^{agree to} donate the organs.

In an ambush more than 50 security personnels were also killed and his name was also surfaced in that case.

Home Minister of your state also wants to do the same as it will send a message in the public about handling of law and order problem with iron hands. Thus send killer through one officer that 'if you do the same, you will get the full support of ruling party in future also'.

- (1) Constitutional duty to follow & defend law vs
Political pressure to kill the criminal.
- (2) Faster justice to the slain vs due process

The dilemma arises as it is known that the said person is criminal and no one wants him to be spared. However, the previous experience and lack of evidence is compelling to go for instant justice rather than judicial process.

The dilemma is not about the end whether the means needed to adopted for the same.

(b) The Ministers and Home Ministers have advised to kill the criminal captured.

The following merits & demerits are involved in this advice

Merit

- faster justice to the victim
- Building police image among people
- sending out a message to mafias
- Personal favour from ruling party


